Getting There: By Car - From Mitzpe Ramon drive 6 km north to Ruhot junction and turn left (west) on to road 171. Drive for 28 km, passing "Ramon ascent" and "Hemet Cistern", until you reach the sign "Mt. Ramon" on your left. Turn left onto the dirt road and drive for 1.2 km to the parking area. Note this dirt road is accessible to regular vehicles, but you will have to drive carefully as there are some areas of gravel and pot holes.

**Mount Ramon** 

**Starting point:** mt. Ramon parking area **Finish point:** mt. Ramon parking area

Hike Description: Head out on the red trail as it climbs to the peak of mt. Ramon.

Congratulations! you have reached the highest point in the Negev, and the third highest mountain in Israel - 1038 meters above sea level.

Continue on the red trail along several Tumuli-piles of rocks which are, in fact, ancient burial sites, and next to the K-line (look at the sign on the ground). This 4000 year old structure has baffled archaeologists as to its use and origin, stretching for 4 km completely straight from mt. Romem to mt. Ramon.

From here the trail will climb down into a ravine and up along tilted layers of limestone. You'll walk along the cliff with the magnificent view of the western tip of Maktesh Ramon and arrive at the memorial site for the Astronauts of the Columbia space shuttle which crashed in 2003.

Connect to the **black** trail and follow it southwest back to the peak and down to your car.

Attractions: Majestic view, Ancient stone structures, Historical memorial site.

## **West Ramon Loop**



Getting There: By Car - From Mitzpe Ramon drive 6 km north to Ruhot junction and turn left (west) on to road 171. Drive for 28 km, passing "Ramon ascent" and "Hemet Cistern" until you reach the sign "Mt. Ramon" on your left side. Turn left onto the

dirt road and drive for 1.2 km to the parking area. Note this dirt road is accessible to regular vehicles, but you will have to drive carefully as there are some areas of gravel.

Starting Point: Mt. Ramon parking area **Finish Point:** Mt. Ramon Parking area

Hike Description: Head out on the red trail as it climbs to the peak of mt. Ramon.

Congratulations! you have reached the highest point in the Negey, and the third highest mountain in Israel - 1038 meters above sea level.

Continue on the red trail along several Tumuli-piles of rocks which are, in fact, ancient burial sites, and next to the K-line (look at the sign on the ground). The Red markers and the purple markers will drop down into a ravine and arrive at the edge of Makhtesh Ramon. The Red markers turn left, and the purple markers arrive at a T intersection. Turn Right (south) and follow the purple markers for 1 km following the cliff line on your left side. Arrive at a blue marked dirt road, and a parking area with a viewpoint to the center of the Makhtesh.

Follow the dirt road and the blue markers for 1 km to the east.

In the winter, keep your eyes open for the endemic Rhubarb - Large leaves, lettuce size, laying on the ground and a pink flowering stock growing from them. Arrive at an intersection with black markers and continue with the blue for 100 meters. The purple markers will appear again splitting off to the left. Follow them along the ridge for 2.8 km. The trail will connect with red markers.

Note - the next section is a short detour (2 km total) to a viewpoint. If you are in a hurry you can skip it: Turn right at the intersection and follow the red markers for 1km south. You'll arrive at a saddle with a "transparent" trail leading to the top of mt. Ido. This is an impressive viewpoint and the rock kerns left by hikers over the year make it an ideal spot for creative photography. Head back north on the red trail to the intersection.

From the purple and red intersection follow the red markers northeast for 300 meters to a saddle and the view of the Makhtesh again.

The red marked trail will head down into the Makhtesh. passing layers of colourful sand in volcanic rock. Walk for 1.8 km to the bottom and the dirt road in the center of the Makhtesh, marked in **black** markers. Turn right (northeast) along the **black** dirt road follow it for 1.4 km to a meeting with green markers on the left.

**HIKING TRAILS** 

Turn left on the green marked trail and follow it north towards the gorge between two black hills of volcanic rock.

Once you've passed between the hills, the trail will turn to the left (southwest) and head towards the base of the cliff, where you'll turn northwest and head up to the top. From the pass at the top continue along the green markers for another 500 meters to a meeting with a blue marked trail on the left. In the spring this barren valley becomes an amazing meadow of flowers.

Turn left (southwest) and follow the blue markers up along a small valley for 2.6 km until it returns to the cliff line and meets a red marked trail. Continue southwest (right) along the red marked trail, keeping the view of the Makhtesh on your left side.

Arrive at the small memorial site for the Astronauts of the Columbia shuttle that crashed in 2003. Find the **black** markers and follow them for 900 meters to the mt. Ramon and head west on the red trail back to the parking area and your car.

**Attractions:** Really awesome view, ancient rock structures, colorful rock and volcanic formations, ancient trails, flowers in the season, possible Onager sighting.

### **Hemet Cistern Loop**

**Getting There:** By Car - From Mitzpe Ramon drive North 6 km along HW 40 to HARUHOT intersection. Turn West onto rd. 171. Drive for 13 km and reach a sharp curve to the right and then to the left and park at the parking lot marked with a brown sign -"Hemet Cistern"

**Starting Point:** Hemet Cistern parking lot. **Finish Point:** Hemet Cistern parking lot.

**Hike Description:** You can start by walking over to the Cistern itself. It is located just Northeast from the parking lot, behind the white dirt mound. The cistern was dug into a soft layer of clay and its walls are held by roughly-cut stones from a hard limestone layer that can be found nearby. The cistern was dated to the Iron Age, and with little restoration work - it still fills up with rain water every year. The cistern is fed by two simple aqueduct-trenches which divert runoff from the slopes of the hill. The water flows through three settling pools which allow some of the mud and clay to settle, and then continues into the cistern itself.

Start your hike along the green markers which will take you on a short climb to the flatland just East of the cistern. As you continue on the plain you will slowly enter the mouth of a shallow desert ravine. Look carefully stones buried almost completely in the soil arranged in lines across the wadi. These are terraces that were built about 2000 years ago to collect soil and allow agriculture in this region. The trail will slowly curve right and then left and eventually will descend into a small canyon. Once in the canyon the green trail will end at a blue trail. Turn left on the blue trail and head up canyon in a general Southeastern heading. As you gradually climb the scenery will open up until suddenly in front of you the crater will be exposed. Time to pull out the camera and admire the view. Don't forget to drink some water while you're here.

Time to head back: Return on the blue trail, down canyon, and when you reach the meeting point with the green trail - continue along the blue markers. A few surprises will reveal themselves along this stretch: Ancient Pistacia trees, small hidden rock puddles and old Bedouin caches. These last ones were built under overhangs of rock in the Northeastern cliffs of the canyon. They were used for storing seeds and possessions that were not needed on long journeys. The blue markers will start climbing out of the canyon to the right and will turn back to the parking lot and the Hemet cistern. After a rainy winter there is nothing like dipping in the cistern at the end of this hike.

**Attractions:** Flowers in the season, Majestic view, swimming in the cistern, Pistacia trees, Bedouin hideouts
